# We're still open!

There have been lots of changes to the way we work as a Christian charity, with some staff being furloughed, others working from home and some taking on new responsibilities. However, the good news is that Torch House is still open to provide accessible Christian resources (including Bible Reading Notes and the library service), whilst utilising a minimum number of staff. ## **Think**

If your church is considering using a virtual platform, think about whether it is suitable for people with sight loss.

#### Ask

Talk to the people with sight loss within your church to see how you can support them as they may be finding it difficult to access your virtual events/content.

#### Act

If they are not able to access your content, consider offering them some regular personal prayer or connecting them with others in the congregation.

# Virtual Sight Loss Friendly Church?

If you're one of the many churches which have started offering services and home groups over the internet, read on!



We've been doing lots of testing in this area and some of our Torch Fellowship Groups have already started meeting virtually, mostly using the Zoom platform. This is great because it's fully accessible for those people with sight loss who have good computer skills, and for those who don't, there's a telephone dial-in option. Just remember that people who need the telephone dial-in details will probably need you to call them and dictate them over the phone. It's therefore a good idea to keep them the same week on week if you can.

If you're using Facebook Live or Youtube, you might find that people with sight loss find it more difficult to access your content. It's always a good idea to phone them and see how they're getting on - they might feel too embarrassed to call you! And in these uncertain times, a friendly phone call is nearly always appreciated.

If they're not able to access your content, consider offering them some regular personal prayer or connecting them with others in the congregation. It's really important to maintain a sense of community in these times, and hearing a familiar voice is great for this. You could also take this opportunity to make sure they have enough supplies and they're still healthy.


# Covid-19 Top Tip

Some people with sight loss really struggle to use computers and might not be able to engage with your virtual worship. Make a point of phoning them so you can discuss a system that works for them. You could also take this opportunity to make sure they have everything they need.
